2022 and 2023 with Anglican Women's Studies

The Anglican Women's Studies Centre (AWSC) is a project of justice, set up by General Synod, over 15 years ago, to ensure the equitable access to theological education by women in the Anglican Church in this Province. AWSC enables this access for women through support and mentoring, by networking, encouraging, promotion, advocacy and publishing.

We have three areas of AWSC mission: three pou of our whare.

Just Theology- Virtual Theology Chats, access to scholarships and study

Right relationships- with women across the church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and the Pacific, as well as globally. Advocacy for women.

Just leadership- training, mentoring, and supporting leaders and potential leaders.

The Council for Anglican Women's Studies operates with a volunteer Council of 6 women and a paid administrator (16 hours a week).

The Provincial Hui is a major focus for Leadership development and theological education.

The Provincial Hui planned for 2020 was postponed to October 2021, then to April 2022. However Covid-19 made us pivot into several Pop-Up Hui- local based one day events.

Christchurch All Souls Merivale, with a hearty number of local wāhine in attendance. Guest speakers Miriam Fisher and Jess Hall presented on "Art for Spirituality, Art for Scholarship," . It was their collective assertion that the arts both have a God-ordained place in mature Christian worship and present a timely challenge to contemporary scholarship regarding sources of theological knowledge. Hamilton . A dozen clergy women met at Ethos Café. They discussed ways

- to bring the female voice into strategic discussions
- for a gender balance of presenters at events
- the perceived assumption female clergy are more able to be non-stipendiary than male clergy
- for a regional/diocesan data base for female clergy to enable ongoing contact
- to explore how to research data relating to women's ordained ministries with a focus on stipended/non-stipended roles and leadership. (Sandy Neal)

Auckland Held at Holy Trinity Cathedral, our discussion centred mainly on how the women were manging as well as sharing anything that was new in their lives. The theme of lack of real support to women in ministry was a common thread among the attendees. This lack of support is believed to be rooted in the hierarchical and structural setting of our church.(Nyasha Gumbeze)



2023 was a year of building relationships.



February in Samoa . In February, the Council, along with Bishop Waitohiariki, and some Link representatives, travelled to Samoa and met over three days with the AAW, local women and as a Council. The theme was *Women, Faith, Society*, celebrating the unity and diversity of our three tikanga Church, and making visible the vision of AWSC, which is to advance the ministry, leadership and theological education of women. We experienced generous



hospitality from the members of All Saints, Apia, wonderful organisation from Zita Reid, and a great deal of learning and sharing experiences. This meeting also provided a forum to raise concerns about the abuse and misuse of power in the Church.



April in Christchurch In April, a second smaller Hui was held in Christchurch . The theme was *Ways of Knowing God* through art, meditation, inter-tikanga sharing, a hangi and much informal connecting. Present at this hui were more Link representatives, and local women, in the beautiful All Souls Church complex in Merivale, with comfortable accommodation at St Margaret's College. This Hui provided another opportunity for the issue of abuse to be further discussed. The need for education and access became clear. This in turn led to a meeting with the House of Bishops, and also to two full sessions being scheduled at

the November Provincial hui, with leadership from the Registrar for Ministry Standards, and the Commissary for Reconciliation and Restoration.

Auckland in November ASWC was delighted to be able to hold a Provincial Hui in 2023, after all the disruption of the Covid years. Over 75 women from all areas of Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia attended.

This hui was a major focus for leadership development and theological education, for networking, resource sharing, deepening spirituality, and building essential relationships. Speakers included Dr Emlly Colgan, The Revd Dr Eseta Mateiviti-Tulavu, Ms Wendy Ball, Ms Miriam Fisher, Rev Fran and Rev Keri-Ann Hokianga, Rev Val Riches, Rev Tai Tuatagaloa and many more.

3. Silvia Purdie was granted funds to assist with promotion of her book, Awhi Mai, Awhi Atu \$700.00


4. Merekaraka te Whitu was granted funding for Toastmaster training, and associated costs \$1000

Those standing down by General Synod 2024 are Bettina Maxwell and Nyasha Gumbeze. One from tikanga Polynesia will also be replaced.
