> I think that the biggest challenge for women in our church is to continue to remind the wider church about our mission to respond to the poor, the alienated and all those who struggle. Often women are the ones who do the actual work in the midst of those in pain, and to tell and value their stories as part of the wider story is vital. There is also a need for good women role models in leadership, and we seem to be struggling in our church for women to be nurtured and elected into leadership positions. For example, New Zealand is known for having the first Diocesan woman bishop, but we still continue to only have one woman bishop two decades on. There is still work to be done in terms of attitudes toward women in leadership, as well as support and valuing our contribution.

For the past four years I have been a guest lecturer in liturgy at St John's Theological College, and I am also part of the Bishop's Ministry Adviin the Diocese of Auckland. These roles provide opportunities for me to encourage, support and celebrate with women, as well as men, in all that It is also about realising dreams and responding to the call to love and nurture others.

May our journey together be full of hope and inspiration as we experience Christ amongst us in love, compassion and restoration.

What is the International Anglican Women's Network and how can I be part of it in this Province?

The IAWN is the global voice of Anglican women and is responsible for reporting women's concerns to the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC). The purpose of IAWN as an official network of ACC is to enable and empower all women of the Anglican Communion to work cooperatively at national, provincial and communion-wide levels to strengthen the ministries of women in God's world and to ensure women are influential and equal participants throughout the entire Anglican Communion. The Network's main role is advocating for women and women's concerns in the church; promoting equal participation of women in decision making throughout the church; facilitating networking among women and women's organisations within the church and beyond, especially in responding to women's needs and issues. In 2007, the Joint Standing Committee of ACC asked IAWN to ensure that the study of the place and role of women in the structures of the Anglican Communion, called for in the resolution, be carried out. IAWN have begun to gather statistics of women in decision-making roles; information thus far obtained is available in the IAWN document, "Progress Report on the Implementation of Resolution ACC 13-31".

The challenge for each tikanga of this Province is to ask itself "In the past five years since the beginning of this task, has the number and variety of women in decision making and governance roles increased or decreased?"


